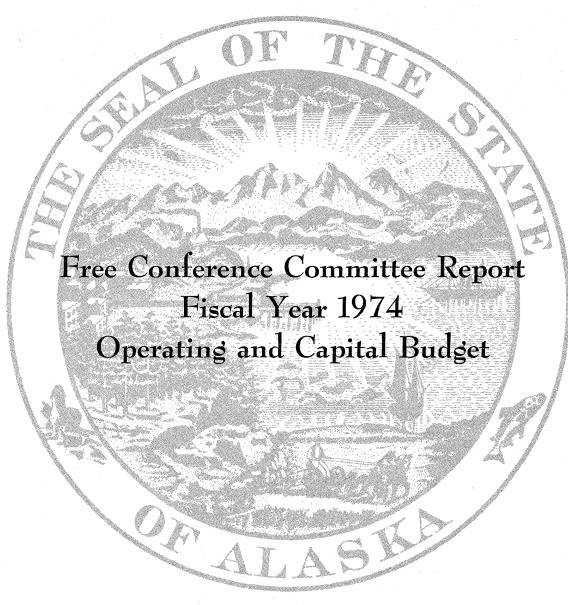

Department of Education

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Library Construction Grants (\$106.2 Federal)	\$ 190,200
Grants are made to localities for the construction of community library facilities; they are contingent upon local applications and availability of local matching funds. As of October, 1972, preliminary applications totalling \$8,005,000 had been received from 14 communities. The largest of these are Anchorage Central (\$4.0 million) and Fairbanks regional (\$3.0 million).	
Library Acquisition Fund for Rare Items	10,000
This fund would allow the State Library to purchase rare items for its historical collection as the items become available. The fund would be used only as necessary to prevent irreparable loss to Alaska of specific materials not for duplication of items already available through loans or in other Alaska libraries.

Acquisition of Museum Artifacts	\$	25,000
The \$25,000 acquisition fund appropriated for the first time in FY 73 has been very useful in strengthening the State Museum's collection. It has been used primarily to purchase historic Alaskan fine art, thereby strengthening a weak point in the collection. This fund will allow the museum to continue to purchase rare items as they become available and to bid for select pieces when necessary.		
Free Conference Committee Intent: No portion of this appropriation may be expended until the State Museum has complied with the directions of the Legislative Budget and Audit Committee regarding a completion of an inventory of collections and improvement of collections security as prescribed in the audit dated January 17, 1973. The Museum shall prepare a report detailing steps taken to comply with this audit and submit this information to the Legislature during the first week of the Second Session of the Eighth State Legislature.

Books for Anchorage Consortium Library		250,000
Library resources in Anchorage have not grown at the same rate as University academic programs. Thus there is a substantial deficit in the number of volumes available. This appropriation would allow for the purchase of about 20,500 volumes at an average cost of \$12 per volume for purchasing, cataloging, and shelving.		
Ketchikan Community College Improvements		35,000
Free Conference Committee Intent: Twenty-five thousand dollars of this appropriation is for the purchase of library books, and ten thousand dollars is included for the blacktopping of the entrance road/parking lot at the Ketchikan Community College.

This appropriation will cover a variety of small construction projects needed to correct deficiencies noted by the State Fire Marshall.

This appropriation would provide an average of \$1,340 per school for the purchase of library books not included in the operating budget. The intent is to help correct deficiences in the S.O.S. libraries.

Hill-Burton Match (Federal)

\$ 1,152,000

Hill-Burton federal funds of \$1,152.0 may be received for medical facility modernization or new construction which the State will match with \$3.5 million in General Obligation Bond funds authorized in 1972 (also funded by Ch. 85, SLA 1973 as a \$3.5 million loan to the "1972 Health and Medical Facilities Construction Fund").

NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT and ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION

Department of Fish and Game

Weirs and Stream Rehabilitation (\$15.0 Federal, \$39.0 F&G)

54,000

The appropriation funds two projects within the Division of Sport Fish:

- 1. A fish weir on the outlet of Lower Russian Lake to assess red salmon runs as they pass through to upstream spawning areas. (\$30.0)
- 2. Construction of a seawall on Abercrombie Lake to prevent the intrusion of salt water and lake drainage, and the subsequent destruction of a valuable freshwater sport fishery. (\$24.0)

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Salmon Sonar Counter Redesign

The Bendix adult salmon sonar counters have been used in the field four seasons now and further modifications and refinements are required to assure the reliability of the counters. Printer modifications will enable six existing counters to cover the whole band of migration and pinpoint errors of false counting. Designs of improved array will enable the counters to be tested and cleaned at frequent intervals.

Salcha and Good Paster Rivers King Salmon Study

Free Conference Committee Intent: Appropriation provides funding for a feasibility study on king salmon propogation at Salcha and Good Paster Rivers; the department is directed to provide a report detailing estimated project costs to the Second Session of the Eighth State Legislature.

Vessel Repairs

75,000

The appropriation funds the repair and upgrade of two existing vessels, the SHAD and the KITTIWAKE. These improvements will put these vessels in good operating condition for the next several years. Replacement costs for these vessels are more than \$350.0.

Department of Natural Resources

Outdoor Recreation Facilities (Federal)

1,600,000

This appropriation consists of Alaska's FY 74 apportionment from the federal Land and Water Conservation Fund. These funds provide for joint federal and state participation in planning, acquiring, and developing specific outdoor recreation areas and facilities.

PUBLIC PROTECTION

Department of Commerce

Scale House - Glenn Highway

33,000

The new four-lane Glenn Highway presently under construction will require relocation of the present scale located at Mile 11. Four-lane highways generally require two scales, however, a planned interchange on the highway will permit trucks to cross over, thereby permitting the use of one scale. The scale will be located on the highway right-of-way near Anchorage. Site improvements will be provided by the Department of Highways with the costs included in the Federal Aid Highway Program.

Microfilm System

20,000

The Division of Insurance maintains records of 600 insurance companies, including applications, licenses, rate changes and requests, forms, complaints and results of investigations. These records are currently maintained in file cabinets and an electric retrieval file. By utilizing existing microfilming techniques, the Division of Insurance will be able to file and retrieve information much more rapidly, store larger quantities of information in less space, and save considerably on space and personnel costs associated with the maintenance of these files.

Department of Military Affairs

Radio Equipment - Civil Air Patrol

20,000

The Civil Air Patrol has adequate ground communications equipment, but many of its long range aircraft are not equipped with proper radios to effectively utilize the ground equipment. This appropriation will provide improved communications equipment for ten of the CAP's long-range aircraft, thereby greatly increasing the effectiveness of this program.

Inflatable Life Rafts	27,000
Replacement of ten life rafts aboard Southeast vessels that are either defective or approaching the Coast Guard and manufacturer's estimated useful life of 7 to 10 years.	
Outfitting New Ships	200,000
Two new vessels (385' and 235') must be outfitted in FY 74 with expendable items such as tools, linens, galley, utensils, lines, etc. These items are not considered a part of the vessels, but are necessary in making the vessels operational.	
Replace Breasting Dolphins	100,000
Provides a continuing appropriation for the replacement of deteriorating wood pile breasting dolphins with concrete and steel structures. Wooden breasting dolphins have a life expectancy of 5 to 10 years compared to 30 years for concrete and steel.	
Yukon Ferry Study	50,000
Bookkeeping Machine (International Airport Revenue Fund)	12,500
Utilization of a bookkeeping machine by Anchorage International Airport will substantially improve the Accounts Receivable process by combining all functions now being done separately.	
Larson Bay Airport Improvements	100,000

Federal Highway Funds (Federal)

56,000,000

This appropriation represents the estimated federal funds which the state will receive during FY 74. The funds will be \$50,000.0 Federal Aid to Highways and \$6,000.0 Federal Aid Alaska Assistance. The combination of these funds will allow the Department of Highways to continue with the construction of the projects included in the five year plan.

Maintenance Facilities

170,000

Funds are appropriated to replace the existing Big Hurrah Warm Storage (\$50.0) and either move or make major repairs to the Gardiner Creek Station (\$25.0). Funded also are \$15.0 to expand Klawock Maintenance Station and \$80.0 to modernize storage facilities at Anchorage Sand and Chemical Storage.

FOOTNOTES TO SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS

(1) Ch. 14, SLA 1973 provides in part: "\$9,839,500 appropriated by this Act may be used only for flood control projects as determined by the governor. \$10,000,000 appropriated by this Act may be used only for small boat harbor projects as determined by the governor. The money appropriated by this Act shall be repaid to the general fund from the proceeds of the bonds authorized by ch. 201, SLA 1972, and approved by the voters in November, 1972, or from the proceeds of any bonds subsequently approved for this purpose."

By letter dated February 7, 1973, to the Division of Legislative Finance, the Attorney General outlined the problem which prompted the special appropriation:

"Independent bond counsel retained by the State Bond Committee has indicated that a legal question exists regarding the validity of Ch. 201, SLA 1972 (S.B. 278). Under Sec. 13, Art. II, Alaska Constitution, S.B. 278 is required to be confined to one subject. Chapter 201 provides for the issuance of general obligation bonds for capital improvements for flood control and for small boat harbor projects. The "dual proposition" issue is a matter that has been contested in a number of other states but upon which there is no ruling case law in Alaska.

Because a substantial question is involved, bond counsel for the State Bond Committee cannot approve the bonds for sale without test litigation in our courts. Other bond counsel share this view. A favorable decision by the Alaska Supreme Court approving the constitutionality of Ch. 201 would make sale of the bonds possible....

According to Commissioner Easley, the appropriation for a loan for flood control projects is needed at this time since the Corps of Engineers is ready to immediately proceed with the Chena River project. Without the proposed loan the project would have to be indefinitely postponed.

On the other hand, Commissioner Easley notes that the portion of the bond issue for boat harbor projects is designed for use in matching Corps of Engineers projects which have not yet been undertaken. According to Commissioner Easley, the first of these projects is not scheduled until 1974. If, as a result of the litigation, the bonds cannot be issued, he states that it may also be necessary to seek a new bond authorization for boat harbors from the next session of the Legislature."

BONDS

The following measures pertaining to bonds issued by the state or its agencies were passed during the 1973 legislative session.

- Ch. 2: Providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$11,500,000 for the purpose of paying the cost of capital improvements for civic, convention and community recreation centers (issue disapproved by the voters at the March 6 special election).
- Ch. 70: Provides that a bill authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds shall contain a statement of the scope of each major project included in the proposed bond issue. This statement of project scope shall be distributed by the Lieutenant Governor with each sample election ballot.
- SCR 28: Relating to the leasing of space from the Alaska State Housing Authority provided in part:

"BE IT RESOLVED that the use of the space to be provided by leases from the Alaska State Housing Authority for state offices, courtrooms or combined office and courtroom facilities, as hereinafter enumerated providing for payment in excess of \$12,000 annually, is approved in accordance with AS 37.05.280. The capital cost for the buildings shall not exceed the following:

FURTHER RESOLVED that before the Alaska State Housing Authority sells its evidences of indebtedness for the purpose of financing the construction of the above-named projects, as to each, site, schematic plans, and the dollar amount of the indebtedness must be approved by the Legislative Budget and Audit Committee.

HB 76: Relating to the Alaska State Housing Authority was vetoed by the Governor on May 4, 1973. His letter of explanation appears on the following page.

The Honorable Tom Fink Speak of the House Alaska State Legislature Juneau, Alaska 99801

Dear Mr. Speaker:

I have before me House Bill 76. House Bill 76 is an act relating to the Alaska State Housing Authority. The bill, as you know, would effectively prohibit the Alaska State Housing Authority from issuing bonds for remedying the short supply of necessary public buildings by providing for the financing, construction, and acquisition of public buildings for lease to the State. The bill would be effective as of September 1, 1974.

It is my firm conviction that the Authority that has resulted in construction of many fine public buildings, through issuance of bonds by the Alaska State Housing Authority, has truly met one of the great needs of our State, and its people, over the last decade.

I am just as firmly convinced that to permit House Bill 76 to become law, would place the State of Alaska and the public needs of its people into a retrogressive state.

Therefore, House Bill 76 is hereby vetoed.
