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Chapter No.

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AN ACT

Making a special appropriation to the fisheries business tax grant fund in the Department of Revenue; making appropriations to the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation; the Department of Community and Regional Affairs; the division of business loans in the Department of Commerce and Economic Development; the Alaska Industrial Development Authority; and the mining loan fund in the Department of Commerce and Economic Development; appropriating for the operating and capital expenses of the state government; and providing for an effective date.

* Section 1. The sum of \$3,000,000 is appropriated from the general fund to the fisheries business tax grant fund in the Department of Revenue.

* Sec. 2. The sum of \$126,955,000 is appropriated from the general fund to the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation to be allocated as follows:

- (b) This section transfers and appropriates
- (1) conventional loans for owner-occupied single-family residences and duplexes acquired or made under AS 37.10.070; and

- (c) All right, title, and interest in the then unpaid principal balance of the loans transferred and appropriated to the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation under this section which are not pledged or otherwise secured to the payment of bonds of the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation on July 1, 1983, shall be transferred by the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation to the Department of Revenue for credit to the general fund.
- * Sec. 4. (a) All right, title, and interest in loans of the type described in (b) of this section, in an amount not to exceed \$50,000,000 in unpaid principal as of July 1, 1980, and all right, title, and interest in all mortgages, notes, and other instruments of security made in connection with those loans, purchased or acquired by the Department of Revenue from private lending institutions in Alaska or from the Department of Commerce and Economic Development and held in the general fund on July 1, 1980, are transferred and appropriated to the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation for its home ownership fund (AS 18.56.091).

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(b) This section transfers and appropriates

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- (1) conventional loans for owner-occupied single-family residences and duplexes acquired or made under AS 37.10.070; and
- (2) veterans loans acquired or made under AS 26.15 as of July 1. 1980, for owner-occupied single-family residences and duplexes.

(a) All right, title, and interest in loans of the type described in (b) of this section, in an amount not to exceed \$166,000,000 in unpaid principal as of July 1, 1980, and all right, title, and interest in all mortgages, notes, and other instruments of security made in connection with those loans, purchased or acquired by the Department of Revenue from private lending institutions in Alaska or from the Department of Commerce and Economic Development and held in the general fund on July 1, 1980, are transferred and appropriated to the Alaska Industrial Development Authority for \cdot the purposes of its enterprise development fund.
 - (b) This section transfers and appropriates
- (1) veterans loans acquired or made under AS 26.15 for owneroccupied single-family residences and duplexes;
- (2) commercial fishing loans acquired or made under AS 16.10.300 -16.10.360;
 - (3) small business loans acquired or made under AS 45.95;
 - (4) tourism loans acquired or made under AS 45.90; and
- (5) other business loans acquired or made under AS 37.10.070, as of July 1, 1980.
- (c) All right, title, and interest in the then unpaid principal balance of the loans transferred and appropriated to the Alaska Industrial Development Authority under this section which are not pledged or otherwise secured to the payment of bonds of the Alaska Industrial Development Authority by

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July 1, 1983, shall be transferred by the Alaska Industrial Development
Authority to the Department of Revenue for credit to the general fund.

- * Sec. 10. The unexpended and unobligated portion of the appropriation made in sec. 1 of this Act lapses into the general fund June 30, 1981.

- * Sec. 17. If federal or other program receipts exceed the estimates appropriated by this Act, the appropriation from state funds for the affected

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program may be reduced by the amount of the excess if the reductions are not inconsistent with applicable federal statutes.

- * Sec. 18. If program receipts fall short of the estimates appropriated by this Act, the affected appropriation shall be reduced by the amount of the shortfall in receipts.
- * Sec. 19. If the federal receipts under Title XX of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 1397 et seq.) fall short of the estimate, the amount of the shortfall is appropriated from the general fund.
- * Sec. 20. Amounts equivalent to the amounts to be received in settlement of insurance claims for property losses are appropriated from the general fund to the affected agency for the purpose of replacing the facility or service lost as a result of the incident giving rise to the insurance claim.
- * Sec. 21. If the amount required under applicable statutes for refunds of shared taxes and revenues to eligible political subdivisions exceeds the estimates appropriated by this Act, the excess is appropriated.
- * Sec. 22. Notwithstanding the provisions of AS 37.07.080(e), each appropriation to the University of Alaska is subject to reallocation by the university administration under procedures established by the Board of Regents and the division of budget and management. Transfers may not be made between appropriations except as provided in an Act making transfers between appropriations.
- * Sec. 23. The sum of \$2,000,000 is appropriated from the general fund to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs for the municipal revenue sharing program.

APPENDIX

- 1. Page 2, lines 15-20. This directive to AHFC to transfer back certain loans to the general fund may well not be an appropriation, and if so, cannot be included in this appropriations bill. The same is true on the following page at lines 6-11, and at page 5, lines 1-2.
- 2. Page 6, lines 13-15. There are no so-called shared taxes which are not subject to the prohibition against dedicated funds. Alaska Const., art. IX, sec. 7. To the extent that this blanket appropriation could be considered as obligating the state to use a particular source of money for a particular purpose, it might be held to violate that prohibition. You might wish to veto it.
- 3. Page 6, lines 16-21. An appropriation Act cannot be used to amend the substantive law on reallocation of appropriated money. However, the only entity which could be aggrieved by non-compliance with AS 37.07.080(e) is the legislature. This provision suffices as a message from it that it waives the right of the Legislative Budget and Audit Committee to review the university's reallocations.
- 4. Page 7, lines 2-6. It is unconstitutional to refund taxes duly owed and paid by a private corporation. It is a gift, not for a public purpose. This appropriation is, therefore, unconstitutional and should be vetoed. See pages 5 and 6 of our June 20, 1980 letter to you on HCSSB 313 (Rules) am H (ch. 113 SLA 1980).
- 5. Page 8, line 1. State money cannot be appropriated to pay for an "office facility" for an IRA council. Such a council is not a governmental entity and the "public purpose" under art. IX, sec. 6, of the Alaska Constitution is not evident. This appropriation appears to be invalid and should be vetoed.
- 6. Page 8, lines 2-7. The appropriation for "Kotzebue/Mauneluk human services complex" poses several problems. First, while a grant to Kotzebue for this purpose is valid, this grant is made on its face to Kotzebue and a private corporation jointly, i.e., each would have an equal, joint, and undivided interest. That raises public-purpose questions and, if those questions are satisfactorily answered, appears to breach the separation of powers by constituting a legislative appointment of the persons who are to provide public services under the law. "Mauneluk" must be stricken to avoid those infirmities.

Additionally, this appropriation is to DC&RA and that agency's functions do not include the administration of grants to private corporations. It can administer grants to

community governments. AS 44.47.050(14).

- 7. Page 8, lines 14-16. Adding an "Inc." to the name of the Spenard Community Council makes the original problem insoluable. The appropriation is for "Municipal Grants" and that does not include the Spenard Community Council, Inc. A direct appropriation to a private group to improve a municipal park is not within the legislative power. This change may well invalidate the appropriation here and on page 60, lines 19-20 of chapter 50. We recommend a veto to avoid legal entanglements.
- 8. Pages 11-12, sec. 49. Paragraphs (1) through (33) should be vetoed to the extent that a veto is considered proper. While there was no intent here to supersede your previous vetoes, that could be the effect. The argument can be made that the legislature is free to re-enact the vetoed legislation and if the governor fails to veto it the second time, it becomes law. Accordingly, to avoid any questions, we recommend that the vetos made to the items in chapter 54, SLA 1980 be repeated here to the extent that they are considered proper. The items not vetoed -- even if vetoed previously -- should be considered as valid appropriations.
- 9. Pages 12-13, sec. 50. There is an early attorney general's opinion, 1963 Op. Atty. Gen. No. 9, that the executive cannot be empowered to, in effect, exercise an item veto on the budget after the time set by the constitution for doing so has elapsed. This section purports to do just that. Additionally, this section does not make an appropriation but rather purports to vest the executive with substantive power. It does not belong in an appropriation bill. For those reasons, this section is a nullity. This should be vetoed.
- 10. Page 18, line 20. Direct appropriation to a private entity is unconstitutional in the absence of an equitable or moral obligation. No purpose is stated, and no such obligation for FY 81 is apparent here. There is no grant language. This looks invalid. At best, the Department of Education can elect to handle the money under HB 578 as a grant, i.e., notify the Alaska Repertory Theater and issue an RFP to solicit proposals for theatrical productions. The other alternative is simply to veto the words "Alaska Repertory Theater" and have the department use the money through the Arts Council to support theater work.
- ll. <u>Page 24, line 16</u>. The Department of <u>Administration</u> has no authority to contract for adventure-based education. This appropriation is a nullity. It probably should be vetoed.

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- 12. Page 25, lines 6-7. An appropriations bill cannot be used to establish sliding-fee scales.
- 13. Page 25, lines 7-8. Reducing the appropriation for child support enforcement by the amount of fees collected implies that the receipts can be expended without an appropriation! That implication is incorrect.
- 14. Page 25, lines 9-10. The appropriation to D. of Ed. for Youth Employment Services raises questions as to the department's statutory authority to perform the functions.
- 15. Page 25, lines 14-16. The directions on administration of the agency's AFDC budget have no place in the appropriations bill, cannot alter the existing requirements for budget administration contained in the Executive Budget Act, and cannot vest the legislature with a power of judicial review. (Provisions of this kind are repeated many times in the budget and will not be discussed again.)
- 16. Page 25, lines 17-18. Neither in the budget bill nor in any other act may the legislature legally require an executive department to enter into a contract with a specified entity to perform services for the state. Accordingly, the rider directing a contract with Mauneluk Association as "the fiscal intermediary" is legally a nullity. (This rider is repeated many times; this discussion will not be.)
- 17. Page 26, line 5. The appropriation for "energy assistance program" under Health and Social Services raises a question as to whether there is statutory authority for that department to provide energy assistance -- whatever that is.
- 18. Page 26, lines 13-17. The suballocations to the municipality, which do not require specific purposes, have them. The suballocations to the named non-governmental entities, which do require stated purposes, do not have them. The validity of the latter is thereby thrown in question. Because these are suballocations rather than appropriations, HB 578 does not apply. If it did, before a contract under it could be made, the purposes of these suballocations would have to be specified. The legislature is supposed to do that. It did not. The suballocations are possibly invalid as gifts. A veto of these lines may be the solution here and elsewhere in the bill where the purpose is unstated and the inference is that it is to pay for operating expenses. It will then be possible for the agency to spend the money directly or to contract for services.

- 19. Page 27, lines 19-27 and page 27, line 4-5. These items present the same problems, and require the same solution, as paragraph 18, above.
- 20. Page 27, lines 5-8. An appropriation rider cannot be used to authorize expenditure of public money for persons who do not meet the criteria prescribed by law. This appropriation item could be a nullity if there is no substantive statutory authority to spend money this way.
 - 21. Page 27, line 9. This is a message, not a law.
- 22. <u>Page 27, lines 15-16</u>. Same problem as discussed in paragraph 18, above.
- 23. <u>Page 28, lines 6-17</u>. Same as paragraph 18. (What is a Human Monument Project?)
 - 24. Page 28, lines 25-27. Same as paragraph 18.
- 25. <u>Page 29, lines 21</u>. This is just a message, not a law.
 - 26. Page 30, lines 8-9. Same as 25.
- 27. Page 30, lines 24-25. The rider on how to calculate day-care support cannot amend the substantive law on the subject.
- 28. Page 31, lines 6-7. The Galena and Bethel suballocations do not constitute appropriations, and therefore, no appropriation has been made as a grant to a municipality, HB 578 does not apply, and the money can be reallocated. The same is true for the suballocations discussed in paragraph 18 and the other riders which are similar to them.
- 29. Page 33, lines 10-18. Same as paragraph 18. Additionally, it is highly unlikely that paying the costs of moving Blood Bank of Alaska has a public purpose. It appears to be an invalid gift. We recommend a veto to avoid legal entanglements.
- 30. <u>Page 33</u>, <u>line 20</u>. The appropriation for Public Health Administration to DH&SS would not ordinarily include a grant to a municipality. This raises a question concerning the authority of the department to administer a grant here.
- 31. Page 33, line 22. This suballocation may be a prohibited use of public money to support a private educational institution. It depends on the proper characterization of the recipient and the purpose of the suballocation.

- 32. Page 36, lines 11 and 13. These suballocations are not "appropriations" made for grants, and therefore, HB 578 does not apply. However, to avoid legal entanglements, they should be vetoed.
- 33. Page 36, lines 15-16. This rider probably has the effect of precluding the expenditure of \$150,000 of this appropriation on anything other than contractual services for the severely emotionally disturbed children.
- 34. Page 36, lines 22-24. These are suballocations, not appropriations, and therefore HB 578 does not apply. DH&SS should administer directly.
- 35. Page 37, lines 8-10. Same. Additionally, the grant agreements must spell out the service to be provided.
- 36. Page 37, lines 12-14. Same. (All of these have the same problems as paragraph 18.)
- 37. Page 50, lines 9-10. The rider purporting to preclude expenditure of money to relocate the clerk's office raises serious separation of powers problems and should definitely be vetoed to preserve comity between the branches and to avoid needless and potentially vexing legal entanglements.
- 38. Page 50, lines 26-27. This is a message, not a law.
- 39. Page 51, lines 22-27 and page 52, lines 4-5. Same problems as No. 18.
- 40. Page 52, line 12. Same problems as paragraph 18. Additionally, the grant is not consistent with the substantive provisions of AS 44.33.140 170. An appropriation bill may not be used to amend substantive law. This item is probably invalid and should be vetoed to avoid legal entanglements.
- 41. Page 52, line 17. The allocation for "weatherization" raises a question concerning the department's statutory authority to make this expenditure. It probably does not have that authority.
- 42. Page 53, lines 26-27 and page 54, lines 4-6. Same problems as paragraph 18.
- 43. Page 56, lines 22-23 and page 58, lines 10-13. These are messages, not law.

- 44. Page 59, lines 11-12. The date for the lapsing of the d-2 appropriation is vague. Obviously, not on the date of any d-2 enactment. Some phase-out period is required.
- 45. Page 59, lines 13-14. The Commonwealth North rider is not an appropriation -- or even an allocation or suballocation. It is an "intent" line. Accordingly, HB 578 does not apply, and there is no legal effect. To avoid legal entanglements, it should be vetoed.
- 46. Page 61, lines 15-20. This is a message. From its stern tone, it appears to be an important one.
 - 47. Page 81, lines 10-11. This is a message.
- 48. Page 96, lines 24-27. This is a message, not a law.

I have determined that the appropriation to the Alaska Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission creating the Alaska Fisheries Data Center should not be allowed to stand as this function more appropriately belongs in the Alaska Department of Fish and Game. Further there was no enabling legislation creating an Alaska Fisheries Data Center so that the exact plan set out with this funding is unclear.

The appropriation to the Department of Public Safety for emergency medical services was reduced, but sufficient funding was left to provide for them to buy high priority emergency medical services equipment.

In some instances, direct grants for various purposes were reduced as they appear to be a last minute add-on to an already expanded capital program.

It is my belief that a better public policy would be the retention of management and operational control of the Anchorage Skill Center by the Alaska State Department of Education and that the effort should be coordinated with the Seward Skill Center. I do not feel it is desireable to set a precedent for operation of skill centers by municipalities.

In Sec. 43 of the bill, the effect of adding the proposed language would be that the funds would go into the Municipal Grant Account and thus become subject to the provisions of House Bill 578; this probably was not considered by the legislators that introduced the language in Sec. 43.

The \$600,000 grant to the Alaska Repertory Theatre was reduced by \$100,000 as other funding was also available. The \$250,000 provided for a bottom fish plan at Chernoski was deleted as this was a duplication of funding. Other grant appropriations were deleted in view of the enormous capital projects supplemental that I previously signed into law. In deleting the \$700,000 for the Department of Education for the Northwest Arctic REAA. I took into account the large increase in the foundation formula that was enacted this year.

Almost all provisions for entertainment television have been stricken from this bill in accordance with recommendations made to me by the Department of Education, University of Alaska, the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities, and Lieutenant Governor Terry Miller, Chairman of the State Telecommunications Task Force.

A funding level of approximately \$8.5 million in Senate Bill 165 still allows for a comprehensive educational television package in the State of Alaska. This money will bring a separate instructional television channel into 132 communities throughout the state, as well as provide for local program production and teacher training in how to use video and other educational components of the telecommunications system.

I have signed HCS SB424 am H, an act appropriating \$48,290,000 to the Alaska Power Authority for various power projects throughout the State. The majority of these projects are intended to generate electric power using technologies (including hydroelectric, wind, wood, and tidal power) which will reduce or eliminate dependence on costly fossil fuels.

It was necessary to reduce the amounts appropriated for some of the projects to insure a rational, orderly pace of development. In a related piece of legislation, HCS CSSB 438 (Finance) am H, the Legislature has established a process for the development of power projects by the Alaska Power Authority. This process begins with the preparation of reconnaissance studies, which serve to identify a community's electric power needs and the alternatives available to meet those needs. The next stage of development is a feasibility study which identifies and details the most promising alternatives. The following stage is detailed engineering and design and field work, including FERC license application, and the final stage is construction of the project.

Many of the projects included in SB424 are new projects. In some cases, basic feasibility or appropriateness have yet to be determined. Accordingly, I have reduced the appropriations for each project to the level necessary to perform the appropriate analysis to conform with the Alaska Power Authority procedures.

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I believe that this process will expedite the development of these projects by providing both adequate information and specific decision points. I am committed to the orderly development of projects which can be shown will reduce electric power costs to Alaskans as fossil fuel prices continue to escalate.

One other issue raised by this Act is the use of grants or loans for power projects. It has been the policy of this Administration to provide grants for high risk demonstration projects or other activities which have little or no revenue generating capability but exhibit overriding public purpose. On the other hand, loans are provided to those projects which are likely to generate revenues and are, therefore, capable of repaying the General Fund. While universal grants might further reduce power costs to consumers in the communities receiving State assistance, this would be an inequitable distribution of public funds. Repayment of loans by those projects which are able to do so will make these funds available for additional loans to help meet the power needs of additional communities.

Dear Chairman Meekins:

For a number of years now, unfortunately without a high degree of uniformity, the general obligation bond bills have set out lists of projects and estimates as "allocations," with the implication that reallocations could occur, or they have given the power to the governor to make reallocations. The lack of uniformity and of express authority to reallocate has resulted in considerable uncertainty as to whether any reallocations were valid, and if so, which. We have consulted with the Legislative Auditor and the Director of Budget and Management on the matter, and both agree that something must be done.

We propose a clarifying amendment for inclusion in all new general obligation bond bills. The amendment would insert a new, standard phrase between the word "estimates" and the colon at the head of the list of projects so that the relevant language would read:

to be allocated in accordance with the following projects and estimates, subject to reallocation between projects in accordance with AS 37.07.080(e):

The amendment should be made to HB 560 at page 1, line 27; to CSHB 561 at page 1, line 26, and at page 2, line 8; to CSHB 562 (Finance) at page 1, line 27; and to CSSB 343 at page 1, lines 26-27. The same amendment should also be made to any other general obligation bills now before your committee in which allocations are listed.

We refer to the proposed amendment as clarifying in that we consider the legislature's previous use of the

word "allocations" to mean that reallocations were authorized. See AS 37.07.080(e). However, because the use of that word alone probably does not convey the same meaning to the voters who must approve the bond issue, the power to make reallocations may be limited. The proposed amendment tells the reader, i.e., the voter, that reallocations may occur in accordance with applicable law.

We appreciate the opportunity to present our views on this matter.

Good fiscal policy dictates that I veto SB 575 am, authorizing the issuance and sale of an additional \$15,987,000 in revenue bonds for international airports; and providing for an effective date.

There is presently about \$20,000,000 of outstanding debt in the International Airport Revenue Fund and the debt service is easily handled by the fund with more than adequate debt service coverage. Last year, the legislature authorized \$8.5 million of revenue bonds for Fairbanks International Airport. Projects for which these bonds were authorized are under construction with interim financing from the International Airport Revenue Fund. We anticipate a bond sale this fall to repay the revenue fund and complete the projects. Obviously, nearly 50% additional debt service will be required as a result of In the bond prospectus and trust indenture that will be required for the \$8.5 million issue, we will be disclosing the fact that there will be an additional \$15.5 million contingent liability against future revenue of the revenue fund if this legislation is allowed to stand. This seems to be a harsh and unnecessary liability to place on the International Airport Revenue Fund this year.

Additionally, revenue bond authorizations are not required to await a general election; therefore, there is ample time to enact legislation next year to meet the needs at Fairbanks International Airport. I will be pleased to introduce legislation to accomplish the desired goal.

Relating to the Alaska Power Authority and giving approval to incurring revenue bonded indebtedness of specified projects of the Alaska Power Authority.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

WHEREAS the Alaska Power Authority has submitted to the legislature and to the governor its recommendations for financing various hydroelectric projects, as required by AS 44.56.-180, and statements outlining the general design and demonstrating the financial feasibility of the projects; and

WHEREAS, according to statements by the Alaska Power Authority, the authority is to finance the Lake Elva hydroelectric generation project and will construct, acquire, and own the project; and

WHEREAS the statements of the Alaska Power Authority indicate that the Lake Elva hydroelectric generation project is to be designed, acquired, and constructed for the Nushagak Electric Association under an agreement with the Alaska Power Authority which will provide that the authority has ownership rights in the project as necessary to secure the payment of the principal and interest on revenue bonds, if bonds are issued for the project; and

WHEREAS the statement of the authority submitted to the governor and to the legislature fully satisfies the conditions set out in AS 44.56.180; and

WHEREAS the costs to be incurred in financing the Lake Elva hydroelectric project will require the Alaska Power Authority to issue its revenue bonds in an amount which is estimated not to exceed \$15,000,000; and

WHEREAS it is in the best interests of the state that revenue bonds of the Alaska Power Authority be issued to finance the Lake Elva project; and

WHEREAS the Golden Valley Electric Associaton, Inc., plans to construct, acquire, and operate a waste heat power generation project located at pump stations 7, 8, 9, and 10 of the trans-Alaska pipeline near Fairbanks; and

WHEREAS the project will provide an additional 27,500 kilomatts of generating capacity through the utilization of BTU's which are now being exhausted into the atmosphere and the project will thereby displace oil now in short supply; and

WHEREAS the Golden Valley Electric Association, Inc., has submitted an application to the Alaska Power Authority for assistance in financing the waste heat power generation project and the Alaska Power Authority has by its resolution determined to sell its bonds for the project; and

WHEREAS the Alaska Power Authority, under AS 44.56.180, has submitted to the governor and to the legislature a statement of its recommendations for financing the waste heat power generation project and a statement outlining the general design, demonstration of financial feasibility, and maximum amount of revenue bonds and appropriations necessary for the project; and

WHEREAS the statements of the Alaska Power Authority submitted to the governor and to the legislature fully satisfy the requirements contained in AS 44.56.180(b) and the statements required by AS 44.56.180(c); and

WHEREAS the statements of the Alaska Power Authority provide that through the issuance of revenue bonds the authority is to finance the waste heat power generation project only and is not to construct, acquire, or own the project; and

WHEREAS the statements of the Alaska Power Authority provide that the project is to be designed, acquired, and constructed by the Golden Valley Electric Association, Inc., under an agreement with the Alaska Power Authority which will provide that the Alaska Power Authority has ownership rights in the project only as may be necessary to secure the payment of the revenue bond indebtedness; and

WHEREAS the costs to be incurred in financing the Golden Valley Electric Association, Inc., waste heat power generation project will require the issuance of revenue bonds of the Alaska Power Authority in a maximum estimated amount not to exceed \$110,000,000; and

WHEREAS it is in the best interests of the state that revenue bonds of the Alaska Power Authority be issued to finance the cost of the Golden Valley Electric Association, Inc., waste heat power generation project; and

WHEREAS the State of Alaska has expended considerable time, effort, and money in order to study the Black Bear Lake hydroelectric project; and

WHEREAS a completed reconnaissance assessment shows the Black Bear Lake hydroelectric project is potentially feasible; and

WHEREAS a Federal Energy Regulatory Commission license

application must be prepared by the Alaska Power Authority in order to seek approval to construct the Black Bear Lake hydroelectric project; and

WHEREAS the Alaska Power Authority, under AS 44.56.180, has submitted to the governor and the legislature a statement of its preliminary recommendations for financing the Black Bear Lake hydroelectric project and a statement outlining the general design, demonstration of financial feasibility, and maximum amount of revenue bonds and appropriations necessary for the project; and

WHEREAS the statements submitted to the governor and to the legislature fully satisfy the requirements contained in AS 44.56.180 which must be satisfied before adoption of this resolution; and

WHEREAS the statements of the Alaska Power Authority provide that through the issuance of revenue bonds the authority is to design, finance, construct, own, and operate the Black Bear Lake hydroelectric project; and

WHEREAS the costs to be incurred in financing the Black Bear Lake hydroelectric project will require the issuance of revenue bonds of the Alaska Power Authority in a maximum presently estimated amount not to exceed \$30,000,000; and

WHEREAS it is in the best interests of the state that revenue bonds of the Alaska Power Authority be issued to finance the cost of the Black Bear Lake hydroelectric project; and

WHEREAS the Homer Electric Association, Inc., a Rural Electric Association cooperative, plans to construct, acquire, and install approximately 3,750 new consumer connections and approximately 250 miles of electric power distribution lines; and

WHEREAS the Homer Electric Association, Inc., has submitted an application to the Alaska Power Authority for assistance in financing the consumer connections and distribution lines project, and the Alaska Power Authority has by resolution determined to sell its bonds to finance the project; and

WHEREAS the Alaska Power Authority, under AS 44.56.180, has submitted to the governor and to the legislature a statement of its recommendations for financing the Homer Electric Association project and a statement outlining the general design, demonstration of financial feasibility, and maximum amount of revenue bonds and appropriations necessary for the project; and

WHEREAS the statements of the Alaska Power Authority submitted to the governor and to the legislature fully satisfy the requirements contained in AS 44.56.180(b) and the statements required by AS 44.56.180(c); and

WHEREAS, according to the statements of the Alaska Power Authority, the authority intends, through the issuance of revenue bonds, to finance the Homer Electric Association project only and not to construct, acquire, or own the project; and

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WHEREAS the statements of the Alaska Power Authority provide that the project is to be designed, acquired, and constructed by the Homer Electric Association, Inc., under an agreement with the Alaska Power Authority which will provide that the Alaska Power Authority has ownership rights in the project only as may be necessary to secure the payment of the revenue bond indebtedness; and

WHEREAS the costs to be incurred in financing the project will require the issuance of revenue bonds of the Alaska Power Authority in a maximum estimated amount not to exceed \$3,360,000; and

WHEREAS it is in the best interests of the state that revenue bonds of the Alaska Power Authority be issued to finance the cost of the Homer Electric Association project; and

WHEREAS the Naknek Electric Association, a Rural Electric Association cooperative, plans to construct, acquire, and install a 1,000 kilowatt capacity diesel-powered electric power generator in Naknek; and

WHEREAS the Naknek Electric Association has submitted an application to the Alaska Power Authority for assistance in financing the generator project, and the Alaska Power Authority has by resolution determined to sell its bonds to finance the project; and

WHEREAS the Alaska Power Authority, under AS 44.56.180, has submitted to the governor and to the legislature a statement of its recommendations for financing the generator project and a statement outlining the general design, demonstration of financial feasibility, and maximum amount of revenue bonds and appropriations necessary for the project; and

WHEREAS the statements of the Alaska Power Authority submitted to the governor and to the legislature fully satisfy the requirements contained in AS 44.56.180(b) and the statements required by AS 44.56.180(c); and

WHEREAS the Cordova Electric Cooperative, Inc., a Rural Electric Association cooperative, plans to relocate the present main diesel power generation plant, acquire and install a new diesel power generator, acquire general equipment, acquire and install feeder and distribution line improvements, and construct a new headquarters building, in and near Cordova; and

WHEREAS the Cordova Electric Cooperative, Inc., has submitted an application to the Alaska Power Authority for assistance in financing these projects, and the Alaska Power Authority has by resolution determined to sell its bonds to finance the projects; and

WHEREAS the Alaska Power Authority, under AS 44.56.180, has submitted to the governor and to the legislature a statement of its recommendations for financing the Cordova Electric Cooperative projects and a statement outlining the general design, demonstration of financial feasibility, and maximum amount of revenue bonds and appropriations necessary for the projects; and

WHEREAS the statements of the Alaska Power Authority submitted to the governor and to the legislature fully satisfy the requirements contained in AS 44.56.180(b) and the statements required by AS 44.56.180(c); and

BE IT RESOLVED that the Alaska State Legislature

- (1) approves the general design of the Lake Elva hydroelectric generation project near Dillingham, Alaska, and the incurring of revenue bond indebtedness by the Alaska Power Authority for the project in an amount not to exceed \$15,000,000;
- (2) approves the general design of the Golden Valley Electric Association, Inc., waste heat power generation project near Fairbanks, and the incurring of revenue bond indebtedness by the Alaska Power Authority in a maximum amount not to exceed \$110,000,000 to pay the costs of the project;
- (3) approves the preparation of a Federal Energy Regulatory Commission license application for the Black Bear Lake hydroelectric project, the general design of the Black Bear Lake hydroelectric project on Prince of Wales Island, and the incurring of revenue bond indebtedness by the Alaska Power Authority in a maximum amount not to exceed \$30,000,000 to pay the costs of the project;
- (4) approves the general design of the Homer Electric Association, Inc., project to construct, acquire, and install consumer connections and electric power distribution lines, and the incurring of revenue bond indebtedness by the Alaska Power Authority in a maximum amount not to exceed \$3,360,000 to pay the costs of the project;
- (5) approves the general design of the Naknek Electric Association project to construct, acquire, and install a diesel-powered electric power generator, and the incurring of revenue bond indebtedness by the Alaska Power Authority in a maximum amount not to exceed \$730,000 to pay the costs of the project;

- (7) approves the general design of the Glacier Highway Electric Association, Inc., project to construct, acquire, and install electric power transmission and distribution lines and consumer connections in the City and Borough of Juneau, and the incurring of revenue bond indebtedness by the Alaska Power Authority in a maximum amount not to exceed \$800.000 to pay the costs of the project;
- (8) approves the general design of the Cordova Electric Cooperative, Inc., projects in and near Cordova, and the incurring of revenue bond indebtedness by the Alaska Power Authority in a maximum amount not to exceed \$6,500,000 to pay the costs of the projects; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the projects approved by this resolution may be combined in one bond issue with the amount needed to finance other Rural Electric Association cooperative projects approved by the legislature in accordance with AS 44.56.180.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

WHEREAS the State of Alaska has funded a feasibility assessment for the Tyee Lake hydroelectric generating project by loaning money from the power project revolving fund and the water resources revolving fund to the Thomas Bay Power Commission, an agency jointly formed by the cities of Petersburg and Wrangell: and

WHEREAS the completed assessment shows the Tyee Lake hydroelectric project is feasible; and

WHEREAS the Thomas Bay Power Commission, the City of Petersburg, and the City of Wrangell have requested that the Alaska Power Authority complete the development of and construct the Tyee Lake hydroelectric project; and

WHEREAS a Federal Energy Regulatory Commission license application has been prepared for the Tyee Lake hydroelectric project and the application is presently being reviewed and processed by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission whose approval of the license is expected during the first quarter of 1981; and

WHEREAS the Alaska Power Authority, under AS 44.56.180, has submitted to the governor and to the legislature a statement of its recommendations for financing the Tyee Lake hydroelectric project and a statement outlining the general design, demonstration of financial feasibility, and maximum amount of revenue bonds and appropriations necessary for the project; and

WHEREAS the statements submitted to the governor and to the legislature fully satisfy the requirements contained in AS 44.56.180 which must be satisfied before adoption of this resolution; and

WHEREAS the statements of the Alaska Power Authority provide that through the issuance of revenue bonds the authority is to finance the Swan Lake hydroelectric project only and is not to construct, acquire, or own the project; and

WHEREAS the statements of the Alaska Power Authority provide that the Swan Lake hydroelectric project is to be designed, acquired, and constructed by the City of Ketchikan under an agreement with the Alaska Power Authority which will provide that the Alaska Power Authority has ownership rights in the project only as may be necessary to secure the payment of the revenue bond indebtedness; and

WHEREAS the costs to be incurred in financing the Swan Lake hydroelectric project will require the issuance of revenue bonds of the Alaska Power Authority in a maximum presently estimated amount not to exceed \$120,000,000; and

WHEREAS it is in the best interests of the state that revenue bonds of the Alaska Power Authority be issued to finance the cost of the project;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Alaska State Legislature that the general design of the Tyee Lake hydroelectric generating project near Petersburg and Wrangell and the incurring of revenue bond indebtedness by the Alaska Power Authority in a maximum amount not to exceed \$70,000,000 to pay the costs of the project are approved; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED by the Alaska State Legislature that the general design of the Swan Lake hydroelectric generating project in the Ketchikan Gateway Borough and the incurring of revenue bond indebtedness by the Alaska Power Authority in a maximum amount not to exceed \$120,000,000 to pay the costs of the project are approved.

The general distressed state of the national economy, attending skyrocketing inflation and interest rates, plus the particular circumstances prevailing in Alaska in the wake of oil pipeline completion and delay of the gas pipeline start-up, prompted this Administration to submit a supplemental appropriation request of unprecedented magnitude.

It was my intent to get underway a substantial capital improvement projects program early this year. Legislative response to this request was wild enthusiasm. At one time, I'm told, proposed inclusions totalled over \$800 million.

After determining the priority requirements to fund the 1981 operating budget of about \$1.2 billion; provide a "rainy day" fund of \$350 million; allow \$400 million in Permanent Fund Dividends and tax relief; deposit \$900 million in the Permanent Fund; pay off the State's debt under the Native Claims Settlement Act of some \$300 million and provide at least \$300 million for loan programs, it appeared that about \$520 million worth of capital improvements could be injected into the economy by way of House Bill 60. Accordingly, I indicated this to the Legislature along with criteria which I would use to trim HB 60 down to size, if necessary.

In fairness, many legislators worked hard to assure passage of my highest priority -- Permanent Fund legislation -- and to conform their capital improvement

requests to the criteria I set forth. Accordingly, while absolutely no commitments were made by myself to accommodate a total of \$520 million in supplemental capital improvements, I am today exercising my veto powers only to the degree necessary to trim them to this level. In the process, I am accommodating many items such as rifle ranges, swimming pools, municipal school facilities and other projects which I have vetoed from previous budgets.

Only the economic doldrums of the moment, the unanticipated "excess" revenues, the unprecedented degree of legislative cooperation and the presumption of tacit funding level "commitments" prompt me to accept many proposals which under other circumstances would be vetoed. It should be pointed out that the likelihood of all these circumstances coinciding in the future is remote beyond consideration. Those who delude themselves into thinking otherwise will be rudely shocked. HB 60 should in no way be considered the lead dining car of some new gravy train, but rather the caboose.

In that regard, I am pleased to have received a letter signed by the Co-chairmen of the Free Conference Committee on HB 60 acknowledging that funds in HB 60 for municipal projects will be considered "one-time-only" monies and that there would be no additional money in the future to fund project shortfalls.

That commitment, plus recently passed legislation which requires municipalities to assume all future costs of operation and maintenance before they receive funding for a facility, reduces my concern that these projects will incur downstream collective costs to the State. Be assured that, at least during the next two years, failure to abide by these commitments will invite a veto.

When first submitting my supplemental request I urged the Legislature to act expeditiously. I wanted projects to be underway this year. Unfortunately, because passage was so long delayed, it is likely many projects will not be undertaken this construction season. Others which might have been completed in one season will now not be done until next year. In anticipation

of such delay, I directed State agencies to initiate preliminary work some weeks ago on those HB 60 projects which I intended to approve. In view of the above consideration, HB 60 actually should be considered a two -- or even three -- year capital projects appropriation. Without question there are several items in HB 60 which under more normal circumstances would be vetoed. Those programs which I did cut or veto were those most easily identified as particularly questionable as to propriety or justification.

The legislative exercise which resulted in House Bill 60 underscores dramatically my concern that, given sufficient resources, government will try to do everything for everybody everywhere. Obviously, there will never be sufficient revenues to do so. Accordingly, I am doubly grateful that we finally have in place the Permanent Fund Dividend concept. It is the only collective countering pressure to what otherwise are selective, special interest pressures on government to provide them with ever more subsidized programs or special dispensations.

Once Permanent Fund Dividends have been distributed, the public will have a portion of the oil wealth with which they can determine for themselves how they wish it to be spent: for energy needs, loan interest payments, day care costs, health insurance, or what have you.

My preference would be to give even more of their oil wealth back to the people and permit them to elect how they wish to spend it, instead of having those in government do it for them. This seems to be appropriate. After all, just as states feel the federal government should permit each state to determine how best their shared revenue be spent, municipalities urge states to share revenue for the exact same reasons. What's wrong with carrying that one step further and permitting each citizen to choose how a portion of their revenues are spent? Only by so doing do I see any hope of curbing runaway government growth induced by those interests which succeed in pressuring political bodies to accommodate them. Under such ultimate "grass roots resource sharing" to the citizens themselves, expenditures in behalf of special interests which could reduce the citizen's share will demand greater public interest justification than otherwise

has sometimes been the case. At the same time we could acquaint citizens with true cost of services while providing them with a better means of paying for services they deem most crucial. If the price of achieving this goal was passage of HB 60 it will, in the long term, be considered cheap. Meanwhile, however, I must admit much contained in the bill sticks in my craw, undigested, proving once more that one man's prime rib is another's pork.

Dear Governor Hammond:

At your request, we have reviewed FCCSHB 60, a bill making a variety of supplemental appropriations, appropriations for special projects, grants to various municipalities and communities, and making a wide number of grants available through state agencies. A companion bill, FCCSHB 578, not yet passed by the legislature, provides rudimentary guidelines for administration of the hundreds of grants made by this bill. Suffice to say that the administering agencies are going to have their hands full. We have prepared a section-by-section and line-by-line analysis which is set out below in the Appendix. Before proceeding to it, a discussion of general problems is in order.

With rare exception, public grants are contracts. The government makes a given amount of money available to qualified applicants who promise to perform a given service or furnish a specified product, or both, in exchange for the money. Thus, a Fullbright scholar promises to engage in certain prescribed graduate studies abroad; a municipal government promises to construct a sewer system at home. The arrangement is contractual in nature. This relationship can lead to several problems.

First, the contracting agency must have the statutory authority, express or implied, to acquire or contract for the given service or product. This office, for example, has no authority to contract for the operation of a fair, and were it appropriated money for that purpose, the appropriation would be a nullity. Some of the appropriations in this bill are -- or may be -- invalid on this basis. We have tried to identify them; however, in the time allotted, it is impossible to verify the existence of every agency's statutory authority to contract for such a wide variety of goods and services.

Second, with the exception of political subdivisions, because grants are contractual, the legislature's naming a grantee is a legal nullity. The reason for this is that the legislature's power is to make the law -- here, to appropriate the money for the grants -- but it may not select the agents or contractors to carry out the law. That is the executive's function.

Third, the executive's function is limited to carrying out the law. Where, as is frequently the case in this bill, the purpose of the appropriation is not stated in the bill and is not ascertainable with any degree of certainty from the bill itself or its supporting documents, the appropriation is invalid for failure to have a purpose. The executive cannot pick and choose a purpose. That is a legislative function.

Finally, because of the nearly total absence of statutory provisions governing the grants made by the bill, the executive agencies to whom the appropriations would be made must use contract terms and conditions to ensure that the appropriations are used for a public purpose. While FCCSHB 578 prohibits additional regulations or requirements, it also expressly provides for making contracts for the grants, and the contracts will necessarily contain requirements.

- 1. Sec. 1. No problem.
- 2. Sec. 2. (Ass'n for Education of Young People) The appropriation is unconstitutional if, as it appears, it is for the direct benefit of a private educational institution.
- 3. Sec. 3. No problem.
- 4. Sec. 4. Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 5. Sec. 5. Ditto; however, Department of Education may have no authority with respect to the subject, and the purpose is vague.
- 6. Secs. 6 8. No problem.
- 7. Sec. 9. Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 8. Sec. 10. No problem.
- 9. Sec. 11. Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 10. Sec. 12. Ditto.
- 11. Sec. 13. No problem.
- 12. Sec. 14. Valid; the terminology on education unnecessarily clouds legality -- but not fatally.
- 13. Secs. 15 16. No problem.
- 14. Sec. 17. (Institute of Alaska Native Art) Probably invalid as not having a public purpose, i.e., the institute's "operating expenses" for which the appropriation has been made do not provide a public service for the state. May be salvageable if the Department of Education can work something out, but that probably requires the department to establish the appropriation's purpose, and that is unconstitutional.
- 15. Sec. 18. (Nunam Kitlutsisti) Probably invalid. Training programs cannot be limited by law to residents of specific areas. Must be open to all comers. Governor could item veto all the language after the word "program" on line 15, page 3. The appropriation would then be valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.

- 16. Sec. 19. No problem.
- 17. Sec. 20. (Alaska Rep. Theater) Almost certainly invalid. It is the rule that, as a matter of law, no public purpose is served in paying the bills of a private group or corporation for expenses incurred on its own without statutory authorization for activities which do not directly benefit the government. The only exception is for equitable or moral obligations. If the facts show that this is one, the appropriation is valid.
- 18. Sec. 21. No problem.
- 19. Sec. 22. Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 20. Sec. 23. Ditto, assuming Voc-Ed has authority to make contracts for services for the deaf.
- 21. Sec. 24. No problem.
- 22. Sec. 25. Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 23. Sec. 26. No problem.
- 24. Sec. 27. Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 25. Sec. 28. (Anchorage Civic Opera) The Department of Education may not have authority to contract for this program.
- 26. Sec. 29. (Anchorage Media Center) May be invalid for failure to state a sufficiently definite purpose. By simply making the grant to the media center, the appropriation fails to state a purpose. Unless the underlying circumstances are sufficiently well known to pinpoint the purpose, the appropriation is invalid.
- 27. Secs. 30 32. No problem.
- 28. Sec. 33. (Pipeline film) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 29. Secs. 34 71. No problem.

- 30. Sec. 72. (Salvation Army alcoholism services) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 31. Sec. 73. (Semi-supportive homes) Ditto, but the appropriation may be invalid -- as in 26, above -- for failure to state a purpose.
- 32. Sec. 74. (Foster parents conference) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted, and assuming the agency has the authority to sponsor a statewide conference.
- 33. Sec. 75. (Chugiak headstart program) Ditto, but appears to be an unconstitutional attempt to use public money for the direct benefit of a private educational institution.
- 34. Sec. 76. (Displaced homemakers) Ditto.
- 35. Secs. 77 78. No problem.
- 36. Sec. 79. (Anchorage Children's Center) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates legal problems is enacted, and if it does not constitute an unconstitutional attempt to directly benefit a private educational institution.
- 37. Sec. 80. (Local-hire project) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted; however, the appropriation cannot, as a matter of law, serve a legitimate public purpose if employment on the project is to be limited to persons who are residents of a particular locale or of Alaska. States cannot interfere with the rights of American citizens to secure employment wherever they may be.
- 38. Sec. 81. (Open Door Clinic) Valid under HB 578 if enacted in a version which eliminates the legal problems.
- 39. Secs. 82 86. No problem.
- 40. Sec. 87. (YKHC medical-aid program) Valid under HB 578 if enacted in a version which eliminates the legal problems, and assuming the agency has authority.
- 41. Secs. 88 89. No problem.
- 42. Sec. 90. (AFN summer-enrichment program) Valid under HB 578 if enacted in a version which eliminates the legal

- problems -- and assuming that the department has authority to act on the subject and that the program passes other constitutional requirements, <u>i.e.</u>, open to the general public without regard to race, no direct benefit to private educational institution, and serves a state public purpose.
- 43. Sec. 91. (Anchorage Resource and Research Center) May be invalid for failure to state a sufficiently definite purpose. No state public purpose is served per se by the operation of the Anchorage Resource and Research Center. Unless the center is undertaking to provide some contractual service for the state, this is an invalid appropriation.
- 44. Sec. 92. (Delta Dental) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted, and assuming the agency has authority to conduct the pilot project.
- 45. Secs. 93 95. No grants to named grantees, no problems.
- 46. Sec. 96. (UTDC minority hire study) Valid under HB 578, if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted, and provided that DHSS has authority to study minority line -- an unlikely proposition.
- 47. Sec. 97. (Sitka handicapped children) Valid.
- 48. Sec. 98. (Dillingham handicapped children) Valid.
- 49. Sec. 99. (Juneau totem center) Valid.
- 50. Sec. 100. (Children's Home for Individual Learning) Appears to be invalid as direct benefit to private school.
- 51. Sec. 101. (Bethel Prematernal Home) Valid under HB 578, if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 52. Secs. 102 104. (Anchorage categorical grants) Valid.
- 53. Sec. 105. (Black Woman's Conference) May be invalid for failure to state a sufficiently definite public purpose.
- 54. Sec. 106. (Black Leadership Conference educational enrichment) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.

- 55. Sec. 107. (Beans Cafe) Ditto.
- 56. Sec. 108. (Senior Care Action Network) Ditto.
- 57. Sec. 109. (Hilltop Home) Ditto.
- 58. Sec. 110. (Anchorage Child Abuse Board) If the board is a municipal instrumentality, the grant is valid, otherwise, it is valid under HB 578, if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 59. Sec. 111. (C&RA day care) No grant.
- 60. Sec. 112. (Anchorage Boys and Girls Clubs) Valid under HB 578, if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 61. Sec. 113. No grants, no problems.
- 62. Sec. 114. (Eyak Youth Services) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted, and the services are available to all without regard to race.
- 63. Sec. 115. (Bethel Youth Center) Valid.
- 64. Secs. 116 117. No grants.
- 65. Sec. 118. (Blue Ribbon Comm'n on Otitis Media) Validity is thrown in doubt by failure to state a sufficiently definite purpose. Probably curable by agency action to make the purpose precise.
- 66. Sec. 119. (TCC hospital residential care) Valid under HB 578, if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 67. Sec. 120. (Alaska Medical Systems) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 68. Secs. 121 122. No grants.
- 69. Sec. 123. (Family Psychotherapy) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 70. Secs. 124 132. No grants.

- 71. Sec. 133. (Bristol Bay Native Ass'n) Valid under HB 578, if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 72. Secs. 134 146. No grants.
- 73. Sec. 147. (Lower Y/K aquaculture study) Valid under HB 578, if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 74. Secs. 148 191. No grants to non-governmental grantees.
- 75. Sec. 192. (Ninilchik State Fair) Apparently valid. The state fair associations are probably quasi-governmental entities. See AS 03.20.010--080. The grants must be consistent with the requirements of AS 03.20.020--035, and to the extent that there is a failure, if any, to comply substantially with the substantive law, the appropriation will not be valid.
- 76. Sec. 193. No grant.
- 77. Sec. 194. (Haines Centennial) The commission is probably a city instrumentality, and therefore, the grant is valid.
- 78. Sec. 195. No grant.
- 79. Sec. 196. This was appropriated by FCS HCS CSSB 222 (In that bill, the appropriation lapses on June 30, 1980.) Perhaps this section is supposed to be vetoed.
- 80. Sec. 197. (Koyukon agriculture training program) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 81. Sec. 198. (Tanana State Fair) Valid if otherwise consistent with AS 02.20. (See #75, above.)
- 82. Secs. 199 201. No grants to non-governmental grantees.
- 83. Sec. 202. (Kawerak manpower program) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 84. Sec. 203. (Mauneluk manpower program) Ditto.

- 85. Sec. 204. (Kodiak fisheries education quality control) Ditto. However, the agency appears to have no authority to contract for the service.
- 86. Sec. 205. (Interior Villages Ass'n study) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 87. Sec. 206. (Bethel feasibility study of fish processing) No grant to non-governmental grantee.
- 88. Sec. 207. (Klawock water and sewer study) Ditto.
- 89. Sec. 208. (Bristol Bay waste heat study) Ditto.
- 90. Sec. 209. (Anchorage permit center) Ditto.
- 91. Sec. 210. (Eyak foundation) Invalid on its face. Paying the operating expenses of a non-governmental entity has no public purpose. May be salvageable if a public purpose can be derived, but that raises questions as to the appropriation's not having a purpose sufficiently definite to be valid as an appropriation.
- 92. Sec. 211. (Tlingit-Haida housing) Raises similar problems.
- 93. Secs. 212 214. No grants to non-governmental grantees.
- 94. Sec. 215. (Ahtna borough study) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 95. Sec. 216. (Alternative energy) Valid except for the limitation of the contractor to "an Anchorage-based community group." That limitation has no rational basis nor does it serve any apparent legitimate governmental goal, and therefore, is invalid.
- 96. Sec. 217. (SEACAP) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted, and if a public purpose can be derived. An appropriation to SEACAP in and of itself does not necessarily have a public purpose. This appropriation may well be invalid.
- 97. Sec. 218. (Tanana Chiefs technical assistance on wildlife and land disposal) Has public-purpose problems, probably salvageable, and probably valid under HB 578 if a ver-

sion which eliminates the legal problems is enacted. But even CORA's broad authority does not include wildlife. May be invalid.

- 98. Sec. 219. No grant.
- 99. Sec. 220. (Nunam Kitlutsisti study) Has public-purpose problems and is wanting specificity of purpose required for appropriations. May be valid under HB 578, if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted, but may not be valid.
- 100. Secs. 221 231. No grants.
- 101. Sec. 232. (Atka Air Service) The purpose of this appropriation is wanting in specificity. Could be valid, but uncertain because of its vagueness.
- 102. Secs. 233 253. No grants.
- 103. Sec. 254. (Bristol Bay Fisheries Ass'n salmon marketing) Invalid. The separation of powers doctrine prohibits the Legislative Council from making grants or contracts which are not incidental to the law-making functions of government. If appropriated, this money cannot be expended legally.
- 104. Sec. 255. (Yukon-Kuskokwim crossing study) Engineering feasibility studies are ordinarily performed by the executive. The legislature's function of appropriating public money would, however, provide ample legal authority for it to study the feasibility of major public works programs. As a matter of practicality and public policy, the legislature's lack of resources to administer an engineering study places its doing so in question. But it would be legal if authorized. Unfortunately, AS 24.20.060 does not appear to authorize such studies, and there is no legislative directive to perform one. Perhaps AS 24.20.060 can be read broadly to include engineering studies. But it never has before.
- 105. Secs. 256 258. No grants.
- 106. Sec. 259. (Northern S.E.A.A.) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted. However, the Office of the Governor may not have the authority to contract for aquaculture projects. Could be invalid.

- 107. Sec. 260. No grant.
- 108. Sec. 261. (House Permanent Fund Committee) Probably invalid. An interim committee on the permanent fund has never been legally established.
- 109. Secs. 262 267. No grants.
- 110. Sec. 268. (Joint Gas Pipeline Committee) Probably invalid in that no interim committee on the pipeline has been legally established.
- 111. Sec. 269. (Regional Educational Attendance Area Oversight Committees) Invalid for same reason.
- 112. Secs. 270 275. No grants.
- 113. Sec. 276. (Legislative Council Discretionary Research Projects) The appropriation for discretionary research is in itself valid, and as a practical matter, if the members of the Legislative Council are agreed, the choice of research projects can be left up to the House "leadership." But, legally, the authority to make those choices is vested in the council, and a majority of its members cannot legally be bound by the terms of this appropriation.
- 114. Sec. 277. (Budget & Audit studies on senior citizens and fuel delivery) The proposed expenditures do not appear to be for functions assigned by law to the committee. AS 24.20.201(a). While there is general authority to prepare studies and reports, AS 24.20.201(a)(7), 231(5), that appears to relate to the committee's (and division's) other stated duties. Probably an invalid appropriation.
- 115. Secs. 278 280. No grants.
- 116. Sec. 281. (Totchaket Development) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- 117. Secs. 282 285. No grants.
- 118. Sec. 286. (Begins so-called "capital projects")

 $\underline{\text{Note}}$: A number of the items are too cryptic to permit a determination without additional information. These will be indicated merely by noting that the purpose or object is vague. They could be valid or invalid.

- Page 39
 Line 12 (Tyonek film) Vague.
 - Line 13 (Fairbanks ABE) Vague.
 - Line 19 (Alaska Rep. Equip.) Questionable public purpose. If for bills for past purchases, the appropriation is almost certainly invalid.
- Page 40
 Lines 7-15 (TV grants) Valid under HB 578, if a version is enacted which eliminates the legal problems.
- Page 41
 Line 6 (Transport Co.) Ditto.
- Pages 42 49
 No problems.
- Page 50
 Line 5 (Senior Citizens of Chugiak vehicle) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
 - Line 7 (Mauneluk Human Services Complex) Public purpose will have to be provided by contract. That raises questions as to the appropriation's being specific enough to be valid. This kind of grant really requires substantive law, as for example, the grants for hospitals under AS 43.18.010. Could well be invalid, but might be salvageable, if it is senior citizens housing. Otherwise, the agency has no authority over the subject and cannot spend the money.
 - Line 21 (Semi-Supportive Homes) To be valid, the grant is to the municipality, and it is under a duty to expend it for the purpose but with a sub-grantee of its own selection. The same rule applies whenever an attempt is made to name a pass-through grantee. Otherwise, the grant would be invalid.

 Line 10 (Inuuailiq Youth Program) Ditto.
 - Line 12 (Ass'n for Education of Young Children) Ditto.
 Additionally, no public money can be expended
 for the direct benefit of a private educational institute. The named association
 appears to be ineligible to receive a grant.
 - Line 14 (Women in Crisis) Municipal grantee is free to choose its own contractors.
 - Line 23 (Family Planning) In order to have a public purpose, the grant must be for the grantee to provide a public service. By specifying that the grant is for the grantee to purchase things for itself, the appropriation throws in doubt its own public purpose.
 - Line 25 (Fairbanks Memorial Hospital birthing room)
 It is difficult to see what state public purpose is served by the terms of this appropriation. This appears to be an invalid gift of public money to a private corporation.
- Page 52

 Line 16 (Y-K Health Corp.) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted.
- Page 53
 Line 13 (Health Care Advocates) Municipal grantee may select its own grantees.
 - Line 14 (Smoking) Ditto.
 - Line 15 (Alaska Treatment Center) Ditto. Additionally, there may be public-purpose problems here.
 - Line 17 (Carriage House Purchase) Could be a public-purpose problem.
 - Line 18 (Blood Bank of Alaska, Inc.) Similar problems.
- Page 54
 Line 10 (Fairbanks Rehab. Ass'n) Similar problems.

- Line 24 (Gateway REAA School Landscaping) The Department of Natural Resources does not appear to have any statutory authority to landscape school grounds, either directly or by contract. This appropriation could have been made to the REAA. As it is, it cannot be expended.
- Page 55
 Line 25 (Rifle Ranges) There is a question whether ADF&G has statutory authority to acquire rifle ranges.
- Page 56
 Lines 24 and 26 (Spenard Community Council) The grants have to be to the municipality, not to the community council.
- Page 57
 Lines 5, 7, and 9 Ditto.
 - Line 25 (Alaska Zoo) Unless the zoo has become municipally owned, the grant is to the municipality and can be spent on the zoo only under a contract with the municipality which provides for a public purpose.
- Page 58

 Line 8 (Spenard) The grant is to the municipality, and not to the community council.
 - Line 26 (Fairbanks Humane Society) The society can qualify for the money only under a contract with the city to provide a public service.
- Page 59
 Lines 16-17 (Ketchikan Aquaculture) Ditto.
- Pages 60-61 No problems.
- Page 62
 Line 20 (MBE Service Centers) Public purpose is not apparent. Indeed, the purpose itself is not apparent.
 - Line 21 (Bering Sea Fishermen's Ass'n) No purpose, public or otherwise, is given.

- Line 22 (Bristol Bay Marketing) Ditto, but can be inferred.
- Line 24 (Alaska 1984) Raises serious legal question. There is a strong general rule that paying off debts of private parties who undertook activities on their own -- no matter how worthy -- is not considered to further a valid public purpose. The purpose of the rule is to make promoters come to the legislature in advance and to prevent them from, as here, presenting it with a fait accompli.

Page 63

- Line 4 (Energy Dev. Ass'n) Valid under HB 578 if a version which eliminates the legal problems is enacted. Moreover, DC&ED may lack substantive authority over the subject. The lease on energy development needs revision.
 - Line 6 (Grow lights) May not be an authorized activity.
 - Line 7 (Alaska Native Tourism Ass'n) Valid under HB 578 (and authorized by AS 44.33.130) if a version is enacted which eliminates the legal problems.
 - Lines 11-12 (Local suppliers contractors) The statement of intent does not override the substantive law on contracts for goods and services.
 - Lines 14-15 (Alaska Federation for Community Self-Reliance) The choice of a contractor remains in the agency's discretion under FCCS SCS HB 578. Moreover, the agency's authority for demonstration projects is lacking, and its current programs appear to be ultra vires.
 - Lines 21-23 (Alternative energy) Ditto.

Page 64

Line 5 (King Cove generator) This appropriation, like several before it, is for a purpose which is not within the statutory authority of the agency to which it has been made.

- Line 9 (Brevig Mission) Ditto, but APA has sufficient authority.
- Line 10 (Anchorage-Fairbanks Inter-tie) APA has sufficient authority.
- Lines 13-17 (Kuskokwim and Koyokon Agriculture) The public purpose of the appropriation is not apparent. That throws the validity of the appropriation in issue. Assuming that problem can be overcome by contract, the appropriation is valid under HB 578, if a version which eliminates other legal problems is enacted.
- Line 22 (Minto Agriculture) Ditto.
- Page 65 Line 4 Page 67, Line 8 (C&RA Grants) Under a broad reading of the Department of Community and Regional Affairs enabling legislation, AS 44.47.050, the purposes of these grants are within the agency's statutory authority. A number of them are in excess of \$40,000, and that is in conflict with an express statutory limitation. AS 44.-47.140(1). The statutory history of that limitation shows that it was enacted in regard to so-called rural development programs now set out as AS 44.47.130 and not to the broader authority of the agency now set out at AS 44.47.050. Nevertheless, both provisions were repealed and re-enacted together by chapter 20, SLA 1972, which would ordinarily result in the limitation's applying to both.
- Page 68

 No problems except that the pass-through grants must be considered as to the named municipality for the purpose stated. The municipality may, or may not, utilize the named pass-through grantee as its contractor.
- Page 69
 No problems.
- Page 70
 Line 5 (Bethel-Alaska Economic Reporting System) No public purpose is apparent. The legislature's

naming a pass-through grantee creates no legal obligation on the municipality to contract with that grantee. The same is true for the other Bethel grants.

- Page 71
 Line 25 (St. James Mission renovation) The bill contains a number of appropriations to municipalities to restore or renovate churches or church properties. Public money cannot be expended in furtherance of a religion. These appropriations are valid, if at all, only to the extent that the churches or church properties are of historic value to the state. Some objective system for a state official to make that determination is required at a minimum.
- Page 72
 Line 19 (Fairbanks Development Authority) The public purpose is not apparent unless the authority is a municipal agency.
 - Line 25 (Selavik agriculture project) General law cities do not have authority for agriculture projects. This is an invalid appropriation.
- Page 73
 Lines 13, 18, 19, 22, and 25 (Fairbanks North Star Borough) A second-class borough does not have authority to be involved in canneries, gardening or solar energy projects. The appropriations are invalid.
 - Lines 23-24 (Town and Village Ass'n) A second-class borough's authority with respect to these grants is questionable. The validity of the appropriation depends upon its unstated purpose -- which itself raises questions of validity.
- Page 74
 Line 9 (Livestock project) Second class boroughs have authority to provide for recreation. This may include this fair project.

Page 75
No problem.

Page 76

Lines 18-26 An appropriations Act cannot contain substantive law. Hence, the language here does not have the force of law, and if it is inconsistent with substantive law, the latter controls.

The references to the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act are incorrect, presumably, they were meant to be to section 14(c)-(3) and (4), which are codified as 43 U.S.C.A. § 1613(c)(3) and (4). Because the villages are under a duty to convey the land, there is no need for a lease.

Page 77

No problems. The directions to the agency not related to the purpose of the appropriation do not have the force of law.

Page 78 Ditto.

Pages 79 - 81
No problems.

Page 82

Line 11 (Lower Kuskokwim Coast Corp.) Valid under HB

578, if a version which eliminates the legal
problems is enacted.

Page 83
No problems.

Page 84

No problems. We are assuming that the named projects, here and on other pages of the bill, are included in the state road system. If they are not, they must be added to the system for the money to be expended.

Page 85
Line 20 (Regional Housing Authority grants) The authority of DOT/PF to make this grant is questionable. Probably needs to designate the

roads as part of the highway system and a contract with AVCP (or with another contractor under HB 578) to do the job.

Pages 86 - 90
No problems.

Page 91
Lines 24-25 There is some question whether the Legislative Budget and Audit Committee has authority to make a study of limited entry licensing. This appropriation is probably invalid.

- * Section 1. AS 37.05 is amended by adding a new section to read: Sec. 37.05.315. GRANTS. (a) When an appropriation is made as a grant to a municipality, the Department of Administration shall promptly notify the municipality of the availability of the grant. When the Department of Administration receives an agreement executed by the municipality which provides that the municipality (1) will spend the grant for the purposes specified in the appropriation; (2) will allow, on request, an audit by the state of the uses made of the grant; and (3) assures that, to the extent consistent with the purpose of the appropriation, the facilities and services provided with the grant will be available for the use of the general public, the Department of Administration shall pay the grant directly to the municipality. The agreement executed by a municipality under this section shall be on a form furnished by the Department of Administration.
- (b) An appropriation for a grant to a municipality for construction of a public facility lapses if substantial, ongoing work on the project has not begun within five years after the effective date of the appropriation.
- (c) In accepting a grant of money for construction of a public facility, each municipality covenants with the state that it will operate and maintain the facility for its practical life and that it will not

look to the state to operate or maintain the facility or pay for its operation or maintenance.

- (d) Not less than 20 percent of the grant shall be paid to the municipality within 10 days of the effective date of the agreement. The remainder of the grant shall be paid either in monthly installments equal to the amount of grant money the municipality expended in the previous month or in a lump sum as determined by the Department of Administration.
- (e) When an appropriation is made to a department as a grant for a named recipient which is not a municipality, the department to which the appropriation is made shall promptly notify the named recipient of the availability of the grant and request the named recipient to submit a proposal to provide the goods or services, or both, for which the appropriation is made. At the same time, the department shall issue a request for proposals from other qualified persons to provide the same goods or services, or both, in the same area. The department shall contract with the named recipient unless the Office of the Governor, with due regard for any local expertise or experience among those making proposals, determines that an award of the contract to a different party would better serve the public interest. If the contract is awarded to another party than that named by the legislature, the basis of that action shall be stated in writing at the time the grant is issued. The purchase of the goods or services, or both, shall be in accordance with AS 37.05.230(1)(C).
- (f) A grant to a municipality must be made within 60 days after the effective date of the appropriation. A contract under (e) of this section must be executed within 60 days after the effective date of the appropriation.
 - (g) Notwithstanding the Administrative Procedure Act (AS 44.62),

the Fiscal Procedures Act (AS 37.05), and the Executive Budget Act (AS 37.07), a department may not adopt regulations or impose additional requirements or procedures to implement, interpret, make specific or otherwise carry out the provisions of this section unless required by the federal government for participation in federal programs.

- (h) A grant to an unincorporated community made under this section shall be disbursed as follows:
- (1) Within 45 days after the effective date of the appropriation, the Department of Community and Regional Affairs shall notify the governing body of the unincorporated community, if any, that a grant is available.

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- (2) The Department of Community and Regional Affairs shall determine whether there is a qualified incorporated entity in the community area which will agree to receive the grant and administer it, subject to terms generally applicable to private grantees. If there is more than one such entity, the Department of Community and Regional Affairs shall select the most qualified and the grant shall be awarded to that incorporated entity for the purposes of the appropriation; however, the Department of Community and Regional Affairs shall give preference to a nonprofit corporation organized by a community for receipt of the grant.
- (3) If there is no incorporated entity qualified to receive the grant, the Department of Community and Regional Affairs shall administer the program directly or through agents or contractors with whom it may contract in the community area.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

* Section 1. Article II, sec. 11, Constitution of the State of Alaska is amended to read:

SECTION 11. INTERIM COMMITTEES. There shall be a legislative council, and the legislature may establish other interim or special committees, as provided in the joint rules of the legislature. The legislature may establish an interim committee to approve jointly with the governor, as provided by law, state budget revisions, including revisions authorizing the receipt and expenditure of federal and other program receipts as defined by law. The council and other interim or special committees may meet during and between legislative sessions. They may perform duties and employ personnel as provided by the legislature. Their members may receive an allowance for expenses while performing their duties.

* Sec. 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be placed before the voters of the state at the next general election in conformity with art. XIII, sec. 1, Constitution of the State of Alaska, and the election laws of the state.
